Dear Christian Family,

We are finishing a summer of prayer. Today is the twelfth step in our personal prayer journey. Paul tells us to pray without ceasing, but how many of us (myself included) find it difficult to find the right words? Let your love for God and your love for family and friends inspire you to pray for others as they they face personal struggle, evil and natural disaster. Remember that even Christ struggled with feeling abandoned when he cried out in the greatest lament, "My God, My God....Why?" You know the answer. You will find it in John 3:16, and that's why we pray. BELIEVE.



We are grateful to our new landscaping company *Scapes* for weeding the playground.



Baltimore-Washington Conference The United Methodist Church

Church Conference Sept. 19, 2021, 5 PM

Again this year we will be holding a *Church Conference* instead of a *Charge Conference* on **Sunday, September 19th, at 5 PM, in the sanctuary**. All members and constituents of Davidsonville UMC are encouraged to attend. It will be a time of information, fellowship, and celebration, led by our District Superintendent Rev. Sarah Schlieckert.

But what is a Charge Conference or Church Conference anyway?

The Charge Conference is the basic governing body of each United Methodist local church and is composed of all members of the church council. Once a year a meeting must be held to review and evaluate the mission and ministry of the church, set the for the pastor's compensation, elect members of the church council, and recommend candidates for ordained ministry. A Church Conference invites broader participation of the members of the congregation beyond just the church council, allowing all all **members** of Davidsonville UMC to attend and have a voice and vote.

A few weeks ago as we prepared for our annual Church Conference, we remembered with joy and pride all of the innovative ways that we have overcome the restrictions of COVID-19 to engage the community around us and help people grow in their faith. In addition to worship in the sanctuary, we have offered outdoor worship, drive-in worship and online worship. We held Sunday School on the playground. Or as we say here in Davidsonville UMC, our mission is to help people come to know, love and serve God and others in unity.

The Catalyst team has been hard at work, learning how to connect effectively with the surrounding community, discovering people's needs and concerns, and then discerning how best to apply what was learned. The team is seeking a Spirit-led vision that doesn't just respond to circumstances, but ignites faith into action and invigorates people to pursue God's call for our lives and community.

The Holy Spirit inspired the Catalyst team to pray that our congregation and community would come to a deeper understanding of baptism, and people came to us for it! So far this year, six people have been baptized. This summer, the team felt a call to explore many different forms of prayer, and now folks are seeking prayer with us in all areas of their life; birth, death, personal challenges and events that rock the worlds of their families and friends.

She is known for her sense of commitment to her work. "Being strategic, proactive, and having a plan are hallmarks of her leadership. She is also dedicated to helping the local church, district, and denomination preserve what is best, divest from ineffective bureaucracies when they get in the way of ministry, and promote health and wholeness for clergy, laity, and churches." Her husband, Chris, is the Conference Director of Retreat and Camping Ministries. Together they are raising daughters Anna, who is 10 years old and Mary, who is 7 years old.

Rev. Schlieckert noted, "the church is a place where you will see brokenness—it's not immune from that. But it is also a place where we get to live into and live out God's grace, love and mercy together."

Rev. Schieckert began serving as District Superintendent on July 1. All are welcome at her official installation, **October 3, at Severna Park UMC (731 Benfield Road, Severna Park) at 3:00pm- 5:00pm.**



What's Up With The UMC in 2022?

Aug. 29 - Sept. 6, 2022, our denomination's top lawmaking assembly, the General Conference, is scheduled to meet. Every 4 years, delegates from around the globe gather to set official policy. They were originally scheduled to meet in 2020, but the meeting has been postponed twice due to the limiting factors of Covid-19.

They have considered meeting online, but have not found a way to overcome technological challenges, such as the 16-hour difference between the delegates who live in the Philippines and on the US West coast, the inequality of internet availability, and the difficulties in safeguarding voting.

While many resolutions will be considered, the decisions that have been making the news lately revolve around the full participation of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgendered, and Queer, (LGBTQ) persons in the life of the Church. The special session in 2019 did not resolve our differences, leaving the United Methodist Church at an impasse. Individual members as well as the Church at large have been injured, and the Church's witness and mission are being impeded.


The United Methodist Church has a deep desire to fulfill our long-stated mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The United Methodist Church is committed to recognizing, respecting, and protecting the rights and personal dignity of every person, including people of all races, sexual orientations, genders, national origins, ages, and social classes.

A protocol has been suggested which would open the door for new denominations to break away with property and church funds. A traditionalist coalition and a liberationist group already have plans to depart.

If the General Conference is able to meet in 2022, and if they put forth a protocol of separation, then the Baltimore-Washington Conference and other annual conferences will then meet and decide which new denomination they will align with. Local churches, like Davidsonville UMC, would then vote only if they disagreed with the alignment chosen by their annual conference. Time will be allowed for making decisions and the process will be planned carefully with grace.


